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EMPLOYMENT COST INDEX – SEPTEMBER 2010

Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 0.4 percent, seasonally adjusted, for the 3-month period ending September 2010, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. **Wages and salaries** (which make up about 70 percent of compensation costs) increased 0.3 percent while **benefits** (which make up the remaining 30 percent of compensation) increased 0.6 percent.

Chart 1. Employment Cost Index, 3-month percent change, seasonally adjusted, civilian workers, compensation, Sep. 2008-Sep. 2010




Civilian Workers

Compensation costs for civilian workers increased 1.9 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2010. In September 2009, the increase was 1.5 percent. **Wages and salaries** increased 1.5 percent for the current 12-month period, the same as for the 12-month period ending in September 2009. **Benefit costs** accelerated to 2.7 percent, up from a 1.6 percent increase for the 12-month period ending September 2009.

Private Industry Workers

Compensation costs for private industry workers increased 2.0 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2010, higher than the 1.2 percent increase for the 12-month period ending September 2009. The wage and salary series increased 1.6 percent for the current 12-month period. The change for the period ending September 2009 was 1.4 percent. The cost of benefits increased 2.8 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2010, higher than the September 2009 increase of 1.1 percent. Employer costs for health benefits rose 4.8 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2010. In September 2009, the 12-month percent change was 4.7 percent.

Among occupational groups, compensation cost increases for private industry workers for the 12-month period ending September 2010 ranged from 1.4 percent for service occupations to 2.5 percent for production, transportation, and material moving occupations.

Among industry supersectors, compensation cost increases for private industry workers for the current 12-month period ranged from 1.1 percent for leisure and hospitality to 2.9 percent for manufacturing.

State and Local Government Workers

Compensation cost increases for State and local government workers decelerated to 1.7 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2010, down from 2.4 percent for the 12-month period ending September 2009. Prior to this quarter, published values for this series, which began in June 1982, ranged from 1.8 percent in June 2010 to 9.6 percent in June 1982. The slowdown in compensation was due to wages and salaries, which increased 1.1 percent. Prior published values for this series, which also began in June 1982, ranged from 1.4 percent in June 2010 to 8.5 percent in June 1982. Benefit costs increased 2.7 percent. Prior published values for this series, which began in June 1990, ranged from 1.2 percent in December 1997 to 8.3 percent in June 1990.

The Employment Cost Index for December 2010 is scheduled to be released on Friday, January 28, 2011, at 8:30 a.m. (EST).

TECHNICAL NOTE

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) measures the change in the cost of labor, free from the influence of employment shifts among occupations and industries. Detailed information on survey concepts, coverage, and methods can be found in *BLS Handbook of Methods*, Chapter 8, "National Compensation Measures," Bureau of Labor Statistics, on the Internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/pdf/homch8.pdf.

Sample size

Data for the September 2010 reference period were collected from a probability sample of approximately 62,400 occupational observations selected from a sample of about 13,100 establishments in private industry and approximately 11,600 occupations from a sample of about 1,800 establishments in State and local governments.

Historical listings that provide all ECI data are available at www.bls.gov/ect/#tables. Included among these listings is one that provides continuous occupational and industry series. This listing uses the Standard Industrial Classification Manual and Census of Population series through 2005 and the North American Industry Classification System and Standard Occupational Classification from 2006 to the present. It provides the official series from the beginning of the ECI in 1975 through the current quarter. Employer Costs for Employee Compensation data

The costs per hour worked of compensation components, based on data from the ECI, are published in a separate news release titled "Employer Costs for Employee Compensation" (ECEC). The next ECEC release is scheduled for 10:00 AM EST, Wednesday, December 8, 2010. Historical ECEC data are available in summary documents. Since the ECEC is calculated with current employment weights rather than the fixed weights used in computing the ECI, year-to-year changes in the cost levels usually differ from those in the ECI.
